FAMILY FIRST PREVENTION AND SERVICES ACT (FFPSA)



FFPSA FOCUS

Passage of Family First Prevention Services Act is an opportunity moment

to build a continuum of services that is responsive to the specific needs of children, teens, and families.

Two Primary Areas of Focus

- Prevention services to keep children and teens safe and growing up in their homes whenever possible;
- Limiting institutional foster care placements unless it is for the purpose of treatment, and when that is necessary, it is evidence based and trauma informed.



FAMILY FIRST PREVENTION AND SERVICES ACT HAS TWO PRIMARY GOALS:

Funding to Prevent Removal

Services to prevent removal for children who are "candidates of foster care"

Services that can be claimed through Title IV-E

- In home parenting skill-based services
- Mental health services
- Substance use treatment services
- Kinship navigator services

Services must be "promising" "supported" or "well supported" Reduce Inappropriate Use of Group
Care

States can not claim Title IV-E for children unless the placement meets a specific treatment need

Federal funding for group placement that does not meet a treatment need ends after 14 days

Residential treatment programs must meet standards to be a "Qualified Residential Treatment Program" (QRTP)



FFPSA FOCUS

- Information Memorandum: ACYF-CB-IM-18-02;
- Public Law 115-123: Enacted February 9, 2018

FFPSA amends:

- Title IV-B, subparts 1 and 2 programs to reauthorize and make other revisions
- Title IVE foster care program to create new optional prevention funding under Title IVE
- Place Title IVE payment limits on child care institutions
- Reauthorize the Adoption Incentives Program
- Other Changes



TITLE IVE PREVENTION SERVICES:

■ Time- limited (12 months) foster care prevention program and services- Provides new optional title IVE funding for time-limited (one year) prevention services for mental health/substance abuse and in-home parent skill-based programs for candidates for foster care without regard to whether the child would be eligible for Title IVE foster care, adoption, or guardianship, pregnant/parenting foster youth, and the parents/kin caregivers of those children and youth.

States electing to provide title IV-E prevention services and programs must submit a *Prevention Services and Programs* fiveyear plan as part of the title IV-E plan (section 471(e)(5)of the Social Security Act (the Act))

FFPSA PREVENTION SERVICES IN LOUISIANA

- Implementing two evidence based programs
 - Intercept (Youth Villages Program)
 - Child First
- Pilot Areas in 2021-2022
- Expanded implementation 2023

CHILD FIRST

- In-home visiting program
 - > Two-generation
 - > Evidence-based
 - Mental health model
- Clinical team structure
- Holistic approach
- Decreases stressors by connecting to comprehensive community-based services and supports
- Promotes a responsive, nurturing, protective, parent-child relationship



CHILD FIRST INTERVENTION

Components

- Family engagement and stabilization
- Comprehensive assessment
- Family-driven Plan of Care
- Mental Health Consultation
- Child-Parent Psychotherapy
- Connection to community services and supports
- Building executive functioning

Team Intervention Process

- Services last 6 to 12 months (can increase to 18 months)
- In-home visits include Clinician and Care Coordinator team
 - Occur 2 times/week during the 1st month
 - Occur once per week or more after 1st month
- Team caseloads average 10-15 cases, based on complexity and geography



CHILD FIRST IN LOUISIANA

- Target population
 - Families with children age 0-6 experiencing:
 - > Emotional problems
 - > Behavior problems
 - > Developmental delays
 - Exposure to trauma with an incident of child abuse or neglect
 - > Significant risk of child abuse or neglect
 - Families experiencing challenges due to substance abuse, domestic violence, mental illness, and poverty related issues
 - ➤ Initial focus on substance involved families

CHILD FIRST GOALS/IMPLEMENTATION

Goals

- Prevent child abuse and neglect
- Enhance parent and child executive capacity, allowing children to remain safely in the home
- Promote child and parent mental health
- Promote child development and learning
- Access community-based services and supports

Tentative Pilot Areas (January-June 2023)

- East Baton Rouge
- Rapides
- Caddo
- Livingston
- Orleans
- Tangipahoa
- St. Tammany
- Alternates: Lafayette, Calcasieu, Jefferson, Ouachita

INTERCEPT

- An intensive, in-home services program that includes
 - Family sessions
 - Mental health support
 - Parenting skills training
 - Help with education, as well as peers and schools
 - Assistance with accessing community resources
- Prevents out-of-home placements
- When out-of-home care is necessary, reunifies as quickly as possible
- Meets with the family 3 times a week
- Provides 24-hour crisis intervention to the family
- Services last 4-9 months
- Collaboration with other providers, schools, case managers, and community supports
- Develop individualized treatment plans



INTERCEPT

- Population Served
 - Families with youth ages 11-17 experiencing:
 - Suicidal/homicidal behaviors
 - Physical aggression
 - Sexually inappropriate
 - Fire setting behaviors
 - Runaway behaviors
 - Victim of commercial sexual exploitation
 - Substance abuse
 - Juvenile justice involvement/FINS
 - School problems
 - Parent/child conflict
 - Sibling conflict
 - Negative peer relationships
 - Pregnant/parenting
 - Other



INTERCEPT BENEFITS

- √ Families receive support more frequently
 - Someone in the home 3 times a week
- ✓ 24/7 crisis intervention services
- ✓ Families receive clinical interventions in their homes
- ✓ Weekly review of progress/needs and monthly reports
- ✓ Case assistance for DCFS staff in areas with high caseloads
 - Reduction in the number of home visits if family is cooperative

INTERCEPT GOALS

- ✓ Reduce youth entries into care
- ✓ Shorten the length of stay for youth who must enter care
- ✓ Meet families needs while reducing involvement with Child Welfare (long term)

INTERCEPT IMPLEMENTATION

- Areas of pilot
 - Currently implemented in East/West Jefferson, Orleans, Livingston,
 St. Tammany, and Tangipahoa Parishes (Youth Villages providing direct services in these areas)
 - Currently implemented in Caddo Parish (Choices providing services)
- Plan for expansion
 - RFP released (winter 2022-2023)
 - Statewide services begin summer 2023
